

# Celebrating Remarkable People: A Black History Month Quiz

*Learning objective: To develop reading comprehension skills and learn about the contributions of significant historical figures during Black History Month.*

Read the passage below carefully. Use the information provided, along with your own knowledge, to answer the questions. Make sure to use full sentences.

Black History Month is a time to celebrate the stories and achievements of Black people throughout history. It is a chance to learn about people like Mary Seacole, a brave nurse who travelled to the Crimean War to care for wounded soldiers. She used her own money to set up the 'British Hotel' to provide food and comfort. Another incredible figure is Walter Tull, who was one of the first Black professional footballers in Britain and later became an officer in the British Army during the First World War. By learning about these individuals, we honour their courage and the lasting impact they have made on our world today. Their stories teach us about the importance of standing up for what is right and helping others.

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**2. Why is Walter Tull considered a pioneering figure in British history? (2 marks)**

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**3. In your own words, why do you think it is important to celebrate Black History Month in our schools today? (2 marks)**

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**4. Find and copy one word from the text that describes Mary Seacole's character. (1 mark)**

**5. Max the monkey wants to know how much money you think it would cost to run a small hotel today. If a loaf of bread costs £1.50 and a tin of soup costs £0.80, how much would those two items cost in total? (2 marks)**

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**Draw:** Draw a portrait of a hero who inspires you. Include a speech bubble showing one kind or brave thing they might say.
